


Hepatitis C: A resource guide for alcohol and other drug services

Hep C targets and treatment



The World Health Organisation (WHO) has set targets to reduce new Hepatitis C Virus (HCV) infections by 80% and HCVassociated deaths from liver disease by 65% by the year 2030.

In order to achieve these targets, appropriate treatments need to reach those that need them to eliminate infection and prevent the risk of transmission to others.


In Australia, new direct acting antiviral medications were made available on the Pharmaceutical Benefits Scheme (PBS) in March 2016 to all people living with HCV, regardless of disease stage. The new treatments are well tolerated, come in tablet form, are relatively short duration (8-24 weeks, generally 12 weeks) and have very good outcomes (95-99% elimination rates).

Treatment Project: Increasing access of alcohol and other drug service users to Hepatitis C Virus testing and treatment

In response to the PBS listing and commitment to the WHO goal, Australian states and territories are making efforts to increase the number of people tested and treated for HCV. The Eliminate Hepatitis C Australia Partnership, coordinated by the Burnet Institute and funded by the Paul Ramsay Foundation, is a targeted national response to a decline in the uptake of HCV treatment.

Through the EC Australia Partnership, WANADA was funded in 2020/2021 to conduct a capability building project for the WA alcohol and other drug sector. Further funding was received from Sexual Health & Blood-borne Virus Program Communicable Disease Control Directorate WA Department of Health to continue this work in 2022/2023 and 2024.



Key populations at risk of HCV infection and transmission, i.e. people who inject drugs, people who have injected drugs in the past, prisoners, and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples, make up a significant percentage of people accessing specialist alcohol and other drug services.

This guide is to support alcohol and other drug services to increase access to HCV information, testing and treatment for service users at risk of HCV infection and transmission. It includes a list of specific Hepatitis C resources as well as links to sites containing many more relevant resources. The first part of the guide includes quick reference tools, the latter part of the guide has more comprehensive Hepatitis information. Resources are categorised according to target audience.

Peer Based Harm Reduction WA Peer Based Harm Reduction WA (PBHRWA) provides HCV education, treatment and support. Engagement, case management and support are provided by a peer worker throughout treatment. This is a free service for injecting drug users. Hepatitis WA – Deen Clinic Provides Hepatitis C testing, treatment and support. No referral is required. Hepatitis C treatments 100% bulk-billed (need to be eligible for Medicare). For people who do not have a GP, their GP is not treating hepatitis C, or they do not feel comfortable accessing them. GP for this purpose. People who are using drugs are encouraged to use this service if they do not feel comfortable in accessing their GP or do not have a GP. The clinic also accepts referrals from GP's and can support them to treat their patients.
